# Black Country street racing injunction remains in place

Released: Thursday 27 February, 2025

The injunction banning street racing in the Black Country has been permitted to continue by the High Court following a hearing in Birmingham yesterday (Wednesday 26 February, 2025) – with judge, The Honourable Mr Justice Ritchie, finding it to be "very effective".

The injunction, led by the City of Wolverhampton Council on behalf of Dudley Council, Sandwell Council and Walsall Council and supported by West Midlands Police, prohibits people from: participating in, as a driver, rider or passenger, street racing; from promoting, organising or publicising gatherings; or from participating as a spectator.

The injunction covers the whole of the boroughs of Wolverhampton, Dudley, Sandwell and Walsall and anyone found to be breaching it will be in contempt of court and may be imprisoned, fined or have their assets seized. They may also be ordered to pay the council's legal costs of any hearing.

The High Court originally granted the full and final injunction in February 2024 with the injunction and power of arrest remaining in force until at least 2027 subject to annual review.

At yesterday's review hearing, Mr Justice Ritchie permitted the injunction to continue, with minor amendments to the wording, after hearing evidence from the Claimant councils that there was a "pressing need for a continuance" of the injunction.

Pardip Nagra, Wolverhampton Anti Social Behaviour Team Leader, told the court that the injunction had reduced racing and led to seven people being found in contempt of court following committal applications for breach of the injunction in the Black Country over the last 13 months.

Meanwhile PC Mark Campbell from Operation Hercules, West Midlands Police's tactical response to street racing, described how there had been a 38% decrease in complaints relating to street racing in the Black Country between 2023 and 2024.

Mr Justice Ritchie said: "Street racing involves speeding, loud noise, convoys, racing, stunts and obstructions.

"I find that the order has been very effective in protecting the public, catching criminals, bringing them before the court quickly, and giving them a punishment which seems to be working.

"This action has probably saved lives and very probably prevented injuries - and the councils and police should be congratulated on doing it."

Mr Justice Ritchie added that the injunction will remain in place in its current form until the revised order comes into effect in the coming weeks.

# Injunction bans street racing in the Black Country

The High Court has granted a full and final injunction banning 'street racing', also known as 'car cruising', in the Black Country.

It forbids anyone who is a driver, rider or passenger in or on a motor vehicle to participate between the hours of 3pm and 7am in a gathering of two or more persons within the Black Country area at which some of those present engage in motor racing or motor stunts or other dangerous or obstructive driving.

It also covers organisers and spectators, prohibiting people from promoting, organising or publicising gatherings, or from participating in a gathering as a spectator with the intention or expectation that some of those present will engage in street racing.

The injunction covers the whole of the boroughs of Sandwell, Dudley, Walsall and Wolverhampton and has a Power of Arrest attached to it which gives the police the power to arrest anyone who breaches it. Breach of an injunction is a contempt to court and if proved the court has the power to impose a sentence of imprisonment, a fine, or an order seizing a person's assets.

For the purposes of the injunction, stunts are defined as driving manoeuvres often undertaken at such gatherings including but not limited to:

- "Burnouts" causing a vehicle to destroy its tyres by applying power to the drive wheels while braking so as to remain in place while the wheels revolve at speed
- "Donuts/Donutting" causing a vehicle to rotate around a fixed point (normally the front axle)
   while not moving-off causing noise, smoke and tyre marks to be created
- "Drifting" turning by placing the vehicle in a skid so that most sideways motion is due to the skid not any significant steering input
- "Undertaking" Passing a vehicle on its nearside so as to overtake in circumstances not permitted by the Highway Code.

The injunction and power of arrest were granted on Tuesday 27 February 2024 and will remain in force for a period of at least three years, and will be subject to an annual review.

At a hearing on 26 February 2025, <u>The Honourable Mr Justice Ritchie permitted the injunction to continue</u>, with minor amendments to the wording, after hearing evidence from the claimant councils that there was a "pressing need for a continuance" of the injunction. A further annual review of the injunction will be held by the High Court in early 2026, on a date to be fixed in due course.



An injunction banning street racing in the Black Country has been permitted to continue, a council has said.

The injunction, led by the City of Wolverhampton Council, prohibits people from participating in street racing as a driver, rider or passenger, as well as from promoting, organising or publicising gatherings, or participating as a spectator

Anyone breaching the injunction - which covers the whole of Wolverhampton, Dudley, Sandwell, and Walsall - could be imprisoned, fined, or have assets seized.

The authority said permission was given at the High Court on Wednesday.

The full and final injunction was originally granted by the High Court in February 2024, with the order and power of arrest remaining in force until at least 2027, subject to the annual review.

A further annual review will be held by the court in about 12 months' time.

It covers the whole of the four boroughs and anyone found to be breaching it will be in contempt of court and may be imprisoned, fined or have their assets seized. They may also be ordered to pay the council's legal costs of any hearing.

The High Court in Birmingham originally granted the full and final injunction in February last year with the injunction and power of arrest remaining in force until at least 2027 subject to an annual review which was heard on Wednesday(26).
